THE POWER OF POLITICS

He stuck to it, and it worked, with the support of thousands.



Premier-designate John Horgan addressed media June 29 outside Government House after being asked by Lt Gov Judith Guichon to lead BC.

Like a short made-for-TV movie, the plot was laid out but excitement built quickly with some unexpected West Shore Voice N twists and turns.

By 5:30 pm Thursday June 29 the BC Legislature under the BC Liberals had collapsed. Sixteen years led first by Premier Gordon Campbell and then Premier Christy Clark ended swiftly with a 44-to-42 vote: BC NDP and Greens ganged up on the BC Liberals and it was over... quietly at first until the Liberal MLAs had left the chamber, then with an outburst of celebration among the BC NDPs and Greens. By 6 pm Christy Clark had made her way through a hallway funnel of an applauding crowd as she exited the Parliament building and was -- not too far away, on Rockland Avenue -- walking up the steps at Government House to meet with Lieutenant Governor Judith Guichon. The meeting lasted over all swarmed up to the June 29 outcome. hour, for as it turns out, Clark was atshore tempting to persuade Lieutenant GovVoideader (Official Opposition Leader) ernor Judith Guichon to dissolve the waiting in the wings. Not just on June house and call another general election (something she said she wouldn't do).

So much weight on Guichon's shoulders. The vice-regal position is not often tasked with making a decision that is essentially the outcome of an election in which almost 2 million people voted. Now we see it sometimes does come down to the power of one. West Shore And so with a 'we've got this'

packing. Speaking briefly to the media around 7:30 pm outside Government House, Clark was skilful in her choice of words but her usual full-on energy was not quite there. She said the Lieutenant Governor had "retired to make her decision". But it was learned later that Clark had been asked to resign.

That could not have been easy for Guichon, who has donated to the BC Liberals and was happy enough as a rancher to have the TransMountain pipeline run through her property.

In a sense, Guichon had been put on the spot by Christy Clark's strategy of recent weeks. BC had essentially been left without a robust operating government for over seven weeks since the May 9 election. And then a flip-flop to what sounded like an NDP Throne Speech (written by the BC Liberals) was asked of the Lieutenant Governor. On June 22 Guichon delivered a long speech that was clearly not of BC Liberal content or philosophy.

Maybe it was in fact the language required by parliamentary con-Wention for the LG to say on the morning of June 22 in the legislature that she found the assembly "unfit" and that a Speaker needed to be appointed before she could read the Throne Speech. But the tone and style of delivery seemed to surprise Clark and others. Guichon may have just been getting

Anyhow, there was BC NDP 29 as the chips were falling, not just in the last week or so in the legislature, and not just for seven weeks since the May 9 outcome. Becoming premier has been a taste in Horgan's mouth for decades. He has by now built a couple of decades of his life around what came to pass around 8:15 pm last night.

Guichon essentially sent Clarke Neorts of Tweet that pre-empted his exit from Government House around 8:20 pm that evening, Horgan then emerged into the summer evening sunlight with a new dawn ahead of him. He thanked his supporters and promised to do his level-best. It was not a wild election night speech, or even a staunch declaration of how the earth had moved. Everyone was tired after a long day, and a rapid-fire post-election period. Horgan even joked about how he was hungry and preoccupied with getting something **West Shore Voice News**

It was a sublime moment. Apart from applause and some high-fives, the festivities were brief. Where the big shift happens is in the next few and many days that follow. A new permission, if you will, to see and do things differently in BC -- for a wider range of people in a more pro-active and caring way.

Clark said in one of her media followups that the NDP have been left with well-balanced books and a good economy. Well, that is the job of government under any leader's watch. Citizens certainly hope that good financial management will continue and be undertaken by any government. But the tone and vision had to change. That was certainly evident from the chaotic result produced West Shore Voice by voters on May 9.

True leadership for the people is something you just can't fake. It takes hard work, patience, rolling with some nasty punches, and carrying on for the long haul. In that, Horgan has already shown that he's in it for the people. Now he has a chance to show what effective change and growth does look like for everyone along the spectrum. That's the dream. One day long ago he dreampt up becoming Premier. Let's now see the dream unfold now in some wonderful ways for beautiful BC.

But it will be tricky, like for a preemie that may have to fight for its life for a while before stabilizing. A coalitionstyle government like the one now operating in BC is workable, but inherently fragile. Its continuation will require ongoing good will and agreement between the dealmakers. In this case the BC NDP and BC Greens wrote up an accord that they both say they intend to operate by.

In BC now there are 43 Liberal MLAs and effectively 43 NDP-Green votes in the legislature (after a Speaker is appointed from the governing side of the house). Any number of things can set it toward demise, not the least of which would be simple absence of one or

more MLAs from any given vote.

Horgan is fortunate to have in BC Green Leader Andrew Weaver -with whom he must now walk step-bystep -- an articulate thinker who is so far maintaining if not stewarding the principles of progressive governance. Weaver's default role seems to be that of being the rudder on the ship. While 'who made him king' rears up for some (about Weaver), it's really a big responsibility and a thankless task to be the linchpin between two heavy duty players. Weaver seems by temperament and intellect to be well-suited for it. Today he said he is thrilled with the level of collaboration.

The Greens need the NDP as much as the NDP need them. It's actually better that one party's number of seats so greatly outnumbers the other; if they were in the same heavyweight class, a rough and tumble for supremacy would likely soon ensue. The Greens can achieve a lot of their agenda under the mighty wing of the 41-seat NDP, and the NDP need the Greens' three seats to stay in power. Horgan and Weaver both seem levelheaded enough to realize that upsetting their peachy apple cart shouldn't happen any time soon. Their agreement has a "no surprises" clause.

Bottom line, British Columbia is now far better set for a path to a wholesome future than before May 9. There is vision, energy, and fresh desire for a cooperative type of governance. Fingers crossed that BC benefits soon in many areas, such as housing, social programs, jobs, health care improvements, MSP program overhaul, tech economy boost and more.

British Columbians can give themselves a high-five for, ultimately, electing a plan that could work very well for the people. The Legislature is expected tol be back in action by September. wsv



Guichon: guiding the Parliamentary system West Shore Voice News

The Hon Judith Guichon, BC Lieutenant Governor, issued the following statement around 6 pm on Thursday, June 29: "As Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia, and as the representative of Her Majesty the Queen of Canada, I have met with Premier Clark and will accept her resignation. I have asked Mr. Horgan to form a government, he having assured me that he can form a government which will have the confidence of the Legislative Assembly." The BC Liberals will now form the Official Opposition, something they say they're good at from pre-2001. The NDP and Greens signed an accord at the end of May, to work together for progress in BC legislation and affairs of government. Clark's lengthy meeting with Guichon pushed available media time to quite late by the time Horgan had met with the Lieutenant Governor, but TV media managed to catch the item for their late-night newscasts. wsv West Shore Voice News

A strategic plan for water

West Shore Voice News The Capital Regional District (CRD) has a Strategic Plan for the Greater Victoria Water Supply System. They're holding five open houses to inform resi-

dents about it. The west shore open house is on Thursday, July 13 at Juan de Fuca Rec Centre, 1767 Island Highway, in Colwood (5 to 7 pm). In 1999, the first Strategic Plan for Regional Water Management was com-

pleted. The plan, updated in 2004 and 2012, has focused on water quality and watershed protection, options for demand management considering future service populations, and infrastructure priorities West Shore Voice News

Areas of focus for the 2017 plan include water supply system infrastructure investment, adapting to climate change impacts, preparing for emergency and post-disaster water supply, addressing changing trends in water demand, and planning for the future use of the Leech Water Supply Area.

The CRD watershed area is protected for at least 50 years. The Sooke Reservoir holds and supplies most of the water to over 370,000 residents of Greater Victoria. The reservoir capacity was pro-actively expanded in 2002 to accommodate the demands of forecasted regional growth. Water supply levels drop each summer but the reservoir reachs full capacity again by late fall or year-end.

Dropping into one of the open houses is an opportunity to learn about how the CRD plans to provide an adequate, long-term supply of high quality, safe drinking water through the Regional Water Supply System and provide feedback for consideration in the final plan. www.crd.bc.ca/waterplan

Bark mulch fires start from cigarette butts West Shore Voice News

The number of bark mulch fires has begun to decline in the area of the west shore that is served the Langford Fire Department. That's largely due to educational efforts.

"Prior to 2014, we were attending over 50 bark mulch related incidents between mid-June and mid-September when temperatures were at their highest," says Langford Fire Chief Chris **West Shore Voice News**

"After our intensive education efforts, in 2015 we had 26 fires, in 2016 there were 27 fires, and to date in 2017 we have had 12 fires which is a significant reduction. But we won't slow down our education efforts," Aubrey said this week. "We are already almost half-way to 2016's total and we are still in June. July and August are the busiest months for these types of fires."

"Most smokers try to be fairly responsible but we still see people toss cigarette butts out their vehicle windows or into bark mulch beds in urban areas," says Assistant Chief of Fire Prevention Lance Caven.

"It drains fire department resources to attend these totally preventable fires," says Caven. Costs include personnel, water, gear, and vehicle operatios.

"When we split our crews up to deal with a bark mulch fire, that only leaves two guys at station ready to respond. That could put a strain on things if something bigger comes in. Volunteers can be called from home, but that usu-**West Shore Voice News** ally includes a time delay for reaching an incident.

Last week, Langford Fire had three bark mulch incidents to deal with. One at an apartment building in the Millstream area, one at a commercial building near RONA, and one outside the liquor store at West Shore Town Centre.

There are alternatives to bark mulch for landscaping, including river rock and lava rocks. Caven is happy to work with businesses to explore options.

This Canada Day Long weekend, people are reminded to fully extinguish any campfires. "Make 'cold soup' by stirring the ashes around until you can put your hand in and it's stone cold," says Caven. West Shore Voice News

No fireworks should be set off illegally. Sky lanterns can also be a problem, as you're "sending a lit fire into the air and there's no control".

The area is drying up due to heat and wind. Presently the Fire Danger Rating in Langford is Moderate. That can quickly change from day to day. For its danger rating, Langford follows what the province has set for the south coast, says Caven. People can check www.BCWildfire.ca for daily readings.

Caven has been a firefighter for 26 years. He moved up to the Assistant Chief position on June 19, after Chris Aubrey became Fire Chief on June 16 upon the retirement of long-time Langford Chief Bob Beckett. WSV

Sooke Fire Dept: four fires in five hours

Summer has begun and it's hot out there! Last weekend it really "felt like the kickoff to summer in Sooke", says Sooke Fire Chief Kenn Mount.

"There was a lot of energy in the community. But also some carelessness, causing a lot of effort and work around the community."

In a span of about five hours last Sunday, June 25, there were four incidents that Sooke firefighters dealt with. Conditions were hot (temperatures reached about 30°C) and it meant pulling volunteer firefighters away from family time and personal weekend time.

Chief Mount says the four incidents were well-coordinated and required a complex application of various resources around the region to deal with the rapidfire sequence of events.

The first call was a roof rescue in East Sooke (where the firefighters kindly also helped the fellow finish cleaning off his roof). Firefighters were already out training for rope rescue that day, so the timing was oddly coincidental.

Then there was a brush fire to deal with in the Saseenos / Coopers Cove area. A hot cigarette butt had been tossed into the bush along the Galloping Goose trail area. Some kayakers helped advise firefighters of the location.

"The fire was less than an acre in size and we managed it easily. As a Rank 1 surface fire it wasn't growing rapidly. But it was difficult to access, down the Galloping Goose. We could see it was from cigarette butts. Passersby on the Galloping Goose were alarming us... some smoke happening... they could smell it and see it. The fire was growing as we were getting there. The kayakers were very helpful," says Chief Mount.

Meanwhile, there was a medical call in the Sooke core village area. "We were close by," says Mount. Then there was a cali-in for a hedge on fire near the ball field in the Sooke River Road area.

That Sunday's multiple scenarios were "a unique situation", says Chief Mount, with one apparatus going one way, and the other going the other way, to deal with the two brush fires.

The Fire Danger Rating for Sooke for this coming weekend is Moderate. But that can change. Chief Mount hopes everyone will use common sense. No tossing of cigarette butts, and remembering to put out campfires.

"There should be no smoking in general," says Chief Mount. "It's about health and wellness. In this day and age, do you really need to be smoking and hiking at the same time?" wsv

Audit of CRD Emergency Management Program West Shore Voice News

 The Capital Regional District (CRD) is one of four local governments selected for a performance audit of its emergency management program by BC's Auditor General for Local Government (AGLG). Audits are carefully selected based on the likelihood and potential severity of a program disruption.

"Because large-scale emergency events like tsunamis and earthquakes are a risk to our region, emergency management is especially important," says Barb Desjardins, CRD Board Chair. "We are looking forward to this opportunity to learn and continually improve — for the safety and wellbeing of the capital rest Shore Voice News

An audit plan will be developed and an expert advisory committee set up. The AGLG working with local government staff to collect evidence and validate gathered information by conducting interviews and reviewing documents. A final performance audit report will be substantiated by evidence gathered. Shared with the local government for input and to ensure accuracy, the report will then published on the AGLG website. www.aglg.ca

The CRD partnered with the Province in March 2016 to establish a regional emergency management partnership (REMP). The partnership promotes increased cooperation, collaboration and integration between all levels of government during all phases of emergency management. It also enhances emergency preparedness and strengthens regional communications and training.

The REMP steering committee endorsed its first strategic plan on February 2017, which outlined goals, targets and strategies with three priority areas of focus: 1. Understanding regional emergencies, hazards and vulnerabilities to support loss prevention, mitigation and preparedness; 2. Planning for collaborative emergency response, business continuity and disaster recovery by regional partners; and 3. Enhancing the REMP's governance, capabilities and efficiency.

The REMP is a collaborative approach to regional emergency planning (province and municipalities) in the case of a regional or multi-site emergency. www.crd.bc.ca/service/fire-and-emergency-programs/emergency-management

SD62's new board chair the youngest in BC by Mary P Brooke ~ West Shore Voice News

Sooke School District 62 (SD62) has a new Board Chair. Ravi Parmar was acclaimed to the position on Thursday evening, June 27, at a public board meeting. The position started immediately. He switched into the hot seat for the remainder of that meeting. And right after the meeting he was signing paperwork as part of gearing up for this

new responsibility. Outgoing chair Bob Phillips emphasized that "leadership comes from the corporate board, not the chair". But Phillips is eager to see fresh young leadership in education at the board level, and was actively supportive of Parmar becoming the next chair.

Some of Phillips' advice upon stepping down was that "boards run better when people can say what they need to say" and that the face of the board should be "multi-faceted, including at events at the schools". He noted that administrative leadership in today's digital world carries with it a heavy load of constant contact through email and social media.

Parmar wasted no time 'getting digital' on social media that night, receiving hundreds of Likes and notes of congratulations.

Ravi Parmar, 22, is in his first term as an SD62 trustee (elected in Nov 2014), and the youngest school district board chair in BC. He is a

west Shore political science and admin student at the University of Victoria. Phillips has stepped down after two years as board chair, but stays on as a trustee (a position he was first elected to in 1996).

SD62 Trustee and Vice-Chair Dianna Seaton was nominated for the chair position by Trustee Wendy Hobbs (herself a

he appreciated the leadership opportunity and would not let people down.

Attending to witness the move of Parmar into the chair's seat was newlyelected MLA Mitzi Dean (Esquimalt-Metchosin) whose electoral area includes Colwood and Metchosin which are both in the SD62 catchment area. Parmar and Dean are both deep within the John Horgan NDP team, as are Phillips and trustees wiced as board chair. Neil Poirier and Margot Swinburnson.

plans, Parmar said: "School board business does slow down over the summer but I do expect with the potential for a new government and our capital and land acquisition needs there may be periods over the summer where the board may meet." The next board meeting is scheduled for August 29.

SD62 Superintendent Jim Cambridge praised Bob Phillips' leadership and dedication: "Bob has worked extremely hard on development of a strong corporate Board which represents the values of the community and aspirations of

parents for their children."

Cambridge said that SD62 has been fortunate to have "solid committed experience on the Board" with three current trustees having previously serv-

Shore Phillips told West Shore Voice When asked about his immediate whews that "the Bernie Sanders factor" Neally hit home for him. In other words, there were no young leaders in the US democratic race last year. Phillips, still on the board, feels he and his other long-time trustee peers can be a strong guiding influence to the present chair, setting an example for future boards.

One strong voice can speak for many

Sooke is lucky to have Gail Hall as a highly-participatory citizen in this town.

While not every one of her points about the 2016 Annual Report would have been friendly to the ears of Mayor and Council at tonight's Council, the depth and breadth of Hall's overview of Council performance in 2016 was a masterful overview of the not-so-well-met challenges faced by this council last year and into 2017.

Gail Hall began her comments by saying the Annual Report public input session should have been a separate meeting with display boards and an opportunity to discuss the municipal report with staff and other members of the public. As has been done in the past.

"Sticking it in the middle of a regular meeting is inappropriate." Hall said this decision was "one more failure as far as I'm concerned". She continued: "2016 is the worst year that I have ever sat through council meetings or anything else to do with this particular council."

"I don't see excellence anywhere in this room this year," said Hall. In her commentary, Hall explored how committees have been taken away, citing two problems. Having no committees "separates the public away from meetings where things are casual, but more importantly takes away the opportunity for those who sit on committees to learn and maybe come forward next time to run for council." She added: "There's no place anymore for the public. You're supposed to be here for the public." West Shore Voice News

Hall's remarks included a pointed rebuke over the handling of budget items, spending by Mayor and staff on expense accounts, leasing of parking lots that are either not well-used or well-promoted, contracts for roadwork that were not approved by council, and more (in a broad historical context).

"You're taking away from the average person the ability to take part in this place we live in, and did, at one time, love," said Hall to the rapt attention of Mayor and Council in a quiet room.


