# REST FIR

White billowing smoke above the Sooke Hills was visible on Tuesday afternoon, July 4. A wildfire on Mount Quimper was well underway by that time.

By 1:30 pm firefighters were making their way up the trail into the forested area. Fire-suppression helicopters were dropping water onto burning forest.

The sight of smoke was first called in to Sooke Fire Rescue around 1:15 pm, says Sooke Fire Chief Kenn Mount. The halfacre forest fire was considered partially contained by about 4 pm.

On-scene to extinguish the blaze were at least seven Sooke firefighters and crews from the BC Wildfire Service (nine members) and Capital Regional District Parks (seven members).

Including the integrated command, there were over 25 personnel plus the two helicopter

Another human-caused fire. What ended up burning out about 1.5 hectares of forest after two days, the Mt Quimper hillside fire required extensive firefighting resources in hot weather. Cigarettes, campfires & ATVs can spark fires.

teams called out to deal with the Rank 2 blaze, which by 5 pm had come close to West Shore Voice News being Rank 3.

Rank 2 presents as a vigorous surface fire that is starting to move into the ladder fuels on the tree. Rank 3 means there are signs of crowning — i.e. the fire is then jumping from treetop to treetop.

It took 30 minutes for Chief Mount and one other fire official walking up the hill to reach the site of the blaze, to determine the extent of fire and how to handle it. Crews had to make their way up the hill on that hot day (over 23°C), dragging fire hoses behind them. There is no fire hydrant at Harbourview Rd. Water had to be trucked in by the Sooke Fire Department. West Shore Voice N

Ahead of that, initial crews on site used tools to build a hand guard... a line where the surface fire can creep along. The line is dug down to the mineral soil so the fire can no longer grow. "A wet guard was not possible until water could be brought up the hill," says Chief Mount.

At 6 pm on Tuesday evening, crews were doing a bit of rehab, said Mount, before retackling the fire that evening. "People can still expect to see smouldering by Wednesday morning," said Sooke Fire Chief Mount.

Mount Quimper is a popular hiking destination in the Sooke Hills, just east of Sooke (about 9 km from the town core). No residences or other buildings in the area were threatened. West Shore Voice News

This is the 40th fire so far this summer on Vancouver Island considered to be caused by the interaction of people with the natural terrain. The carelessness of hikers and others in the woods is beginning to exasperate some firefighting leadership, who feel that most of these fires could have been avoided.

The Fire Danger Rating for most of Vancouver Island was at High on July 4 (up from Moderate on the Canada Day long weekend). As of noon July 6, an island-wide coastal area campfire ban was put into effect by the BC Wildfire Service, with the exception of the 2km-wide fog zone in Tofino and northern areas of Vancouver Island. wsv

# **Premier-Designate** John Horgan: July 1 evening in Sooke

No speeches, no fanfare. Premier-designate John Horgan arrived unceremoniously at 'Sooke Flats' on Saturday evening, Juily 1.

His staff didn't think he could make the trek over from the mainland in time, after spending the day at 'Canada Day 150' community events in Port Moody and Surrey. But Horgan made a point of it.

John Horgan arrived at Sooke is a soft-spot for the NDP leader who has been MLA for the region (under various riding Canada Day 150. **West Shore Voice News** names) since 2005.

Quick to follow Horgan into the riverside campground area just after his 8pm arrival was the Sooke RCMP Detachment Commander. S/Sgt Jeff McArthur pushed the nose of his cruiser slowly into the area where Horgan would be mingling with the crowd. The engine was left running.

Several other police officers from the Sooke RCMP detachment were on hand for the evening in the park as Horgan mingled with a natural ease among everyone who approached him. Handshakes, conversations, photos with fans, and selfies ... the star-power was there. West Shore Voice News

People seem to have a natural fascination for the 57-year-old NDP politician, for whom Vancouver Island has always been home. People of all ages just naturally approach him and he is open to all. Some folks were wide-eyed to watch or meet the premier-designate down by the river that night.

After about an hour-and-a-half of accepting congratulations from longtime politicians and a wide range of people from the community, Horgan had finally worked his way toward the bandstand with his lawn chair to find a spot ... to sit in the cool night air, listen to the live band, and watch the fireworks among the people. West Shore Voice News

Being in the heart of the Premier's riding is a big deal for Sooke. No doubt there will be benefits and perks for the community of 13,000. But small prices will also be paid. Here's one small example: the promised extra-big fireworks display for Canada's 150 Birthday was disappointing for the crowds that have traditionally gathered along the Sooke Bridge area. Trees along the river this year blocked the view as the fireworks discharge location had been moved across the river, farther away from the Premier-designate. **WSV**

## Horgan to be sworn in as premier July 18

It was announced on July 6 that Premier-designate John Horgan (Langford-Juan de Fuca) will be sworn in as the 36th Premier of BC on Tuesday, July 18 at 2 pm at Government House in Victoria Nest Shore Voice Nev

By then he will also have handpicked his cabinet -- the group of MLAs who will also be sworn in on July 18.

The NDP leader has indicated that his cabinet will not be comprised exclusively of NDP MLAs. Horgan is offering cabinet seats to BC Liberal and BC Green MLAs, as part of his commitment

to maintaining confidence of the house. This follows his promise of confidence to Lieutenant Governor Judith Guichon on June 22 after a slim majority vote in the legislative assembly that defeated the BC Liberal government (vote count: 44 NDP & Greens, vs 42 Liberals).

Top staff are being appointed. Meanwhile, speculation is that Carole James (a former NDP party leader and -- like Horgan -- also a Vancouver Island MLA) will become deputy-premier and possibly finance minister.

Transportation, health care, education, and child care are stated priorities for Horgan in his first term. The legislative session will resume in Sept.

Graffiti tells a deeper story

 Political pundits have pondered if, when and to what degree the dark edge of Trump's hard-right America would filter into Canada. Well, this week in small-town Sooke, we saw likely evidence of it. That's a deep reach into what many still believe is an oasis of human progress here in Canada. The spark of angry thinking is like a small flame in a forest. It can rapidly spread, depending on how dry the forest is. How flame-Mary P Brooke ready is our culture, for this sort of anger to erupt?

Well, right in your face! Graffiti was spray-painted in thick acrylic dark blue paint on one of the most prominent surfaces in town... the front of Sooke Community Hall. Owned by the Sooke Community Association, the vintage building proudly bears a long history of fall fairs, craft markets, political meetings, civic events, concerts, weddings, memorials, performances and dances. Even if not deliberately hand-picked

as a convenient and wide-open canvas for civil disobedience, that location served the purpose of the perpetrators... a message placed front and center.

Let's look at the composition of the defacement. Blue in colour, the word or letters 'DEMS' (reference to Democratics, or leftist politics), and five-corner stars (probably not the Christmas variety). Blue is the party colour used by Democrats in the USA. This could very well be a push-back against the province now being in the hands of the progressive NDP. One or more persons in Sooke doesn't like this new direction. This is scary stuff, for it indicates just under the surface a deep strata layer of resistance to change and the democratic process. And not just that, but an angry thread of it. The community may take heed that not everyone is of one and the same mind for how society might evolve. Generally, we know that, but rarely does it streak with fire across the community sky.

There is always a flip side to a bad scenario, the silver lining if you will. Community volunteers spontaneously came out to begin removing the paint this week. They started by scratching the surface of the vinyl siding with steel wool to remove some of the paint. This incident has also scratched the surface of what lies beneath in the community psyche -- so early in the BC-NDP term of government and in Horgan's home riding -- should be of significant concern to community leaders. This is reminding British Columbians as a whole that we are quite obviously not all of one mind in this province. Sure, the municipality will probably step-up the private security services that patrol around Sooke at night (where were they are on Tuesday night?). But reaching out to all the people of BC -- as Horgan says he will do -- is now evidently a project ready and waiting.

People who enact such aggression against public property but also against the public mind are not likely readers of this attentive editorial space. It's up to the rest of us to set fine examples of real and honest community leadership, support and interaction, and to keep that beat going strong.

And as a footnote, here is an opportunity to look at how many people toss out that casual off-the-cuff phrase about graffiti or senseless damage to public property being "oh it's probably just kids (being reckless)". Have you ever watched the faces of youth if that's said within earshot? It's a careless thing to say, to lump all teens or young people into the default group for reckless behaviour, as if all of them by virtue of their age are irresponsible and open to taking part in willful acts of damage. The graffiti incident in Sooke this week should make it clear that people have some people in town have deeper motives for creating disturbance. Given the depth of the message it's very likely some intently-motivated adults who have done this, and that should be of concern to public officials.

Awards to support studies in law advancement

 From among 15 recipients across Canada, two UVic PhD students have won a top Canadian award. Ryan Beaton and Ryan Tonkin are each receiving three-year doctoral scholarships as announced July 5 by the Pierre Elliot Trudeau Foundation. It is Canada's most prestigious doctoral award in the social sciences and humanities. In total the two awards come to at least \$250,000.

Ryan Beaton, with a Harvard law degree, aims to propose concrete changes to the courts that would further the stated aim of aboriginal reconciliation, and to make the legal process more accessible to the general public to support broader democratic debate.

Ryan Tonkin will focus his doctoral research on doctrines of justice in the context of taxation and income inequality. At one point vears ago he was homeless. Now he has a Harvard law degree. wsv

# Canada Day 150 in Sooke West Shore Voice News

**COMMUNITY CELEBRATIO** 

■ There was a strong turnout for the 9 am pancake breakfast and kids activities at Sooke Flats on the morning of Canada Day 150, July 1. That generated a good number of people to be there ahead of the noon-hour official ceremony. After 1 pm when all the official cake-cutting was done. Some people stayed on, joined by more arrivals in the early afternoon for musical entertainment, food, and chatting with friends and neighbours.

Skies were bright with a light breeze, and no chance of rain. Perfect for Canada's sesquicentennial on the west coast of Vancouver Island!

During the opening ceremony -- after the singing of O Canada by the day's Elvis impersonator (great voice!) -- the crowd was in good spirits to hear a few speeches from the dignitaries on the outdoor stage. T'Sou-ke elder Shirley Alphonse gave a blessing, including thanks for local MLA John Horgan becoming Premier of BC.

Chief Gordon Planes of T'Sou-ke Nation recognized the 150th year of Canadian confederation but also said that for the First Nations, the land is "ours for time immemorial". Planes emphasized the importance of maintaining the environment for generations to come "so this place will never change for another 150 years".

A bit tongue-in-cheek, Juan de Fuca Electoral Area Director Mike Hicks declared himself the senior statesman on the stage this year. As in previous years, Hicks has always tipped his hat in good humour to BC-NDP Leader John Horgan as the elder statesman and more eloquent orator. About Horgan, he said: "What an incredible experience that one of our own can be the Premier".

Premier-designate John Horgan (MLA for Langford-Juan de Fuca) arrived later, just after 8 pm. He had been spending the day on the Lower Mainland for Canada Day community celebrations in Port Moody and Surrey.

Fireworks were set to begin after 10 pm.

Randall Garrison, MP (Esquimalt-Saanich-Sooke) hadn't made a speech in

Garrison says Canadians can work together to make a better country, that Canada Day is a time when we can look back as well as look forward. "A window to the future for the next 150 years includes the challenges of climate change and increasing instability in the world," said Garrison.

"If we all rise to meet these challenges, that will make us all proud to be Canadians." He noted fairness and solidarity as common values among Canadians. Garrison emphasized the need to be more inclusive of indigenous peoples who "have allowed us to live on their land".

Sooke Mayor Maja Tait thanked the Sooke Lions Club and Sooke Community Association for organizing Sooke Canada Day again this year. She noted about people in Sooke: "...how we care for each other and give our best in times of need"

In the context of 150 years for Canada, Tait acknowledged over 100 years of dedicated by the local Sooke Fall Fair and Sooke Fire Department. Afterward, Mayor Tait said she enjoys the annual Canada Day Sooke event as a way to enjoy meeting everybody and catching up. "And enjoying the sunshine, especially after such a long winter!" Tait was accompanied by her husband and young son.

In addition to Mayor Tait, Sooke Councillors who made it out to the Sooke Flats for today's events included Bev Berger, Rick Kasper, Brenda Parkinson (who emceed the official event on stage), Kevin Pearson, and Kerrie Reay.

There was a bit more of a noticeable police presence this year during the late morning and during the official ceremony. This was the first Sooke Canada Day for Sooke RCMP Detachment Commander Jeff McArthur. **WSV**

But with their notable regularity, the Canadian Blood Services clinic at the Sooke Legion (always held on Mondays), carried on. Usual hours: 11:30 am to 6:30 pm

As of last week before, there were still 14 open time slots after regular donors had made their appointments, said Ann Chabert, Canadian Blood Services territory manager. But with people getting suddenly busy or distracted on a holiday weekend, it's always possible that spots open up. So the word went out that drop-in donors were welcome (as they always are). There is no upper age limit on donors anymore.

Blood and plasma products are always in demand for surgeries and medical treatments including cancer recovery. West Shore Voice

On that bright sunny holiday Monday, the Canadian Blood Services van was parked outside the Sooke Legion on Eustace Road in Sooke town centre. The van carries all the gear to set up the mobile one-day clinic. A smaller temperature-controlled van is used for transporting the blood donations back over to the mainland for processing. **WSV**

■ The City of Langford is hosting an Economic Forum next weekend. The featured speaker to lead a discussion on innovation, sustainability and housing action is world-renowned architect Avi Friedman, Ph.D.

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The presentation is free and open to the public, at the Four Points Sheraton, 10 am to 12 noon on Saturday July 15.

The event is co-sponsored by the City of Langford and the West Shore Developers Association. Both sponsors have been on the forefront of facilitating and developing more housing in the fast-growing Langford area of Vancouver Island's west shore. Voice

Overall, the Greater Victoria area has been challenged to keep up with the demand for what might be considered affordable housing. Oftentimes, delays or failed attempts to provide more small-size housing and rental units has had to do with municipal bylaws that might be outdated for today's socioeconomic needs, as well as red tape that developers and builders sometimes have to wade through.

Langford has a positive reputation for encouraging housing construction by working cooperatively when it comes to land and development. Sooke is attempting to head in that direction; their new Development & Engagement Committee aims to identify the problem-areas that have effectively stymied responsive home-building in Sooke for many years. wsv

#### West Shore Voice News Housing affordability: it's all relative REAL ESTATE ANALYSIS

Housing affordability is s relative determination, based on incomes, goals, and other factors. Even in Sooke -- considered to be one of the most affordable areas of Greater Victoria, the average home sale price is inching up to half a million dollars. Here are some key June 2017 stats:

LANGFORD: The actual average house sale price of 96 properties in Langford was \$679,155 (data-adjusted HPI was \$579,900). Langford's population is booming, based on the city being considered more affordable within overall Greater Victoria (average GV area sale price of 476 properties last month was \$885,281 with HPI \$691,100). SOOKE: Considered the most affordable area, there were 38 sales averaging at \$469,322 (HPI \$463,500). The gap between the raw sales average and HPI has recently tightened up, which is surprising considering the cost of distance from major services, inadequate transportation support (bus and highway shortfalls), health care limitations, and a modest range of organized recreation. All those factors are a challenge to full-spectrum living and certainly pose challenges to any business that is dependent on a population strong in both numbers and income level. COLWOOD: The average sale price of 19 properties was \$672,589 (HPI \$650,700). **ESQUIMALT:** The average of 12 property sales was \$686,000 (HPI \$582,800). BUILDING: As for changeover of the library building itself (from the leased space on Anna Marie Road over to District-owned land on Wadams Way): a 6-week promise by Vancouver Island Regional Library (VIRL) executives in early May to return with an architect's sketch has come and gone. VIRL communications manager David Carson says there is no fixed date yet for an update to the Sooke community about the design or layout of the new 10,000 sqft Sooke library. Construction is expected to be underway in 2018, with a target opening date of January 2019. WSV
