Regarding Proportional Representation which will soon be voted on in a BC-wide referendum October 22 to November 30, Premier John Horgan said he looks to the possibility of the BC electoral system "as a form of cooperation rather than conflict"

He was addressing delegates of the 115th Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) convention in Whistler on September 14. His speech was livecast.

"The adversarial relationships of opposition in government have been long established and they are valuable. But I think they have to be amended for the 21st century, to be contemporary with the people we represent," he said.

Regarding the wildfire season which is expected to recur with relative severity for the next few years - Horgan acknowledged that wildfire smoke was "omnipresent in entire province". To help address the fires. Horgan said he was pleased with federal government support this summer. He is further encouraged that military personnel will get training in fire and flood responses for next time. For better wildfire management, getting fuel off the forest floor is a start. Horgan says his government also supports an initiative to develop research chairs at



UNBC, UBC Okanagan and Thompson Rivers University "to make sure we're getting real time research and state-of-theart thinking from within the region" shore

At several points in his 35-minute speech he targeted the presumed NDPnaysayers in the audience, to point out the holistic nature of the economy: it's "not just money in and out". In that context he reviewed the interconnection of housing affordability, child care availability, and providing educational opportunities with success for businesses and the workplace. The 4.5% rent increase for 2019 (a spillover from the BC Liberal government) will be looked at this fall.

He spoke of some expected success with an LNG deal, and said that tax regimes and regulations would be similar for all resource industries in BC.

The role of editorials during election season

 As each election season rolls around – whether municipal/trustee, provincial or federal - up comes the question of whether as a news service we will 'endorse' one candidate or party.

The answer to that from West Shore Voice News is always the same. It is not the absolute right or even the expected role of a news service to endorse any one candidate or party for political office. Some newspapers do it, occasionally.



The role of media is to gather information for readers/ electorate, organize it for public consumption (including factchecking and historical lens), and present it within the framework of what are seen to be the issues of the day.

People will point out that in May 2013 this publication (then Sooke Voice News) published a full-page editorial about why then-MLA-candidate John Horgan was the right choice for voters in the Juan de Fuca riding. It was an editorial (an analytical discussion, backed up with facts and observations), not an endorsement. Media must remain observant and offer ideas deemed pertinent to the times. Think of editorials as those essays you were asked to write in high school English class. You're given a topic, you explore it, and offer some

conclusions. In May 2013, the most suitable leader to watch out for the Sooke community's expressed interests was Horgan, and we simply pointed that out.

Similarly, in the 2014 municipal election in Sooke, after almost seven years of attending council and committee meetings at the District of Sooke, this editor proffered up observations based on spending literally hundreds of hours in the media pit. Observations were made about how things were handled at the council level over the years by both candidates in that race (Tait and Haldane); our news coverage spoke to what was seen firsthand. To the public who almost never attends those meetings, it was perhaps a different set of observations than what you see in campaign materials (why be surprised at that?). It's the job of media to

In Greater Victoria there are 13 municipalities. Of those, six can be considered in or interactive within the west shore region: Langford, Colwood, Sooke, Metchosin, Highlands and View Royal. Three of the six mayors stand uncontested (in the smaller jurisdictions of Highlands, Metchosin and View Royal). And while there is a likely return of all incumbents in Langford, the other municipalities are likely to see quite a stir of the council pot after ballots are counted on October 20.

Here's the municipal list: (I) = incumbent. More background and analysis each week. Also see updates at www.westshorevoicenews.com

LANGFORD. Running for mayor is business powerhouse Stew Young (incumbent), who has served over 25 years now on Council and makes a devotion of his attention to his home town. At the last minute, software developer Robert Fraser threw his hat into the mayoralty race essentially to critique the pace and density of development. Running for council are eight candidates (five are incumbents): Denise Blackwell (I), Wendy Hobbs, Rick Johal, Matt Sahlstrom (I), Lanny Seaton (I), Norma Stewart, Lillian Szpak (I), and Roger Wade (I). Denise is a strong affordable housing proponent. Lanny is active with parks and trails. Norma has served 12 years on the planning/housing committee. Lillian has chaired the protective services committee for many years and is strong in the arts. Roger has served on the affordable housing committee.

COLWOOD: Incumbent Mayor Carol Hamilton (two terms as mayor) is being contested by two-term Colwood councillor Rob Martin. For council, 11 candidates (three of them incumbents) are running for six seats: Michael Baxter, Cynthia Day (1), Dean Jantzen, Doug Kobayashi, Gordie Logan (1), Scott McDonald, Eve Millington, Jason Nault (1). Misty Olsen, Stewart Parkinson, and Aaron Weisgerber. Martin has served as chair of West Shore Parks & Rec board as well as the Greater Victoria Public Library. Baxter is a former Colwood staffer (engineering). Day is proactive with youth social services. Jantzen is a police officer in another municipality. Nault is strong on environmental concerns and led the OCP redevelopment. Weisgerber has shifted over from View Royal where he was on council.

SOOKE: The 2018 Sooke mayoralty race is three-way: Maja Tait (incumbent), two-term Sooke councillor Kevin Pearson, and Mick Rhodes. For council, 13 candidates are vying for the six seats (three are incumbents; and three have served on Sooke Council before the 2014-2018 term - SP): Rick Armour (SP), Jeff Bateman, Al Beddows, Doni Eve, Herb Haldane (SP), Peter Jonassen, Rick Kasper (I), Ebony Logins (I), Megan McMath, Brenda Parkinson (I), Phil Rossner, Tony St-Pierre, and Jeff Stewart (SP). These candidates cover the spectrum of left-toright, most with deep silos of community suppport (by philosophy, issues, sector).

METCHOSIN: Long-time mayor John Ranns (I) stands uncontested. For council's four seats there are eight contenders (two of them incumbent): Darren Brown, Brian Domney, Sharie Epp, Norm Hardy, Kyara Kahakauwila (I), MarieFriday, September 14, 2018 ::: WEST SHORE VOICE

 The SD62 school district covers a vast geographical area from within View Royal, through Highlands, Langford, Colwood, Metchosin, Sooke, and Juan de Fuca all the way up to Port Renfrew. Depending on which part of the municipality they live in, some View Royal residents vote in SD62 and others in SD61. The SD62 Strategic Plan for 2018-2021 adheres to visions, values and goals in three

Voters in SD62 cast their ballots for a subset of candidates in two zones: the Belmont Zone (four seats) is essentially drawn from all west shore areas except Sooke and Juan de Fuca which are in the Milne's Landing Zone (3 seats).

The Belmont Zone race sees three incumbents and five new candidates, therefore eight candidates vying for four seats: Cendra Beaton, Bob Beckett, Russ Chipps, Wendy Hobbs (I), Ravi Parmar (I), Dianna Seaton (I), Blair Sloane, and Trudy Spiller. Cendra has been an active parent advocate, particularly for the French stream. Bob is a former Langford fire chief. Russ is chief of Beecher Bay first nation. Wendy has previously chaired the SD62 board. Ravi has chaired the board for over a year. Dianna has in past years served as vice-chair.

In the Milne's Landing Zone there are six candidates vving for three seats (three are incumbents): Bob Phillips (I), Marian Cvitkovic, Neil Poirier (I), Britt Santowski, Margot Swinburnson (I) and Allison Watson. Bob has been SD62 chair and comes from a social work background; he's big on facts and data. Neil is longtime of Sooke; Britt is active media in Sooke which both voters and candi-Values might see as a conflict of interest; Margot has recently retired from a health care career and works hard at the health aspects of SD62; Allison ran in 2011. Recreational infrastructure: BC hand-in-hand with West Shore

Minister of Municipalities and Housing, Selina Robinson, addressed delegates at the UBCM convention in Whistler, September 12.

Communities with populations under 25,000 will be eligible for funding for up to 90% of community recreation infrastructure projects, to be provided by a combination of federal and provincial grants. For smaller communities with populations under 5,000 the funding will be a full 100%.

Announced by the BC government this week, it's good news for many small Vancouver Island

communities. Sooke has just over 13,000 residents, View Royal about 10,500, Metchosin less than 5,000, and Highlands under 3,000. And as nowadays most municipalities in the west shore work collaboratively or interdependently, this could be seen as a recreational boost for the west shore region overall. As separate jurisdictions, there are pockets of smaller term rental platforms agree populations that rely on neighbouring municipalities when it comes to things like recreation and transit.

That funding announcement made in a speech by Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing Minister Selina Robinson September 12 at the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) convention in Whistler drew genuinely enthusiastic applause.

Smaller communities can use the boost to provide jobs and build local economies. Outcomes will include enhanced overall community activity and well-being, said Robinson, creating strong communities on all levels.

Robinson announced that another 2,500 modular homes (along with support systems for occupants) will be made available to municipalities that can provide land for these projects. She said BC will continue its work to moderate the housing market by creating 114,000 homes over the next 10 years. WSV

Short-term rentals may now require business licences

Led by Oak Bay Mayor Nils Jensen, mayors and councillors from around BC this week (at the annual Union of BC Municipalities convention in Whistler, Sept 10-14) endorsed a motion that would see short term rentals like Airbnb be required to have a business licence to operate.

The 'Short-Term Vacation Rental Listing Platforms' Responsibility in Compliance' motion calls on the Province to negotiate a BC-wide agreement with Airbnb and other regionallyactive short-term rental platforms to assist local governments with compliance checks, whereby the shortto require their hosts to provide proof of a valid business license, where applicable, in order to advertise using their service. 




