“Also, lots of material that belonged in the recycling bins ended up in the garbage bin and subsequently in the land. With attendants this hopefully won’t happen again,” says project coordinator Wendy O’Connor. Gloves, reflective vests and garbage bags will be provided to registered teams.

Expansion well underway at Royal Bay Secondary

● **Better weather** and finally a window of scheduling opportunity saw a low-key celebration of building expansion to 1,400 seats at Royal Bay Secondary in Colwood on April 16.

Attended by Education Minister Rob Fleming and a range of community leaders including Mitzi Dean, MLA (Esquimalt-Metchosin) and elected officials from Colwood and Langford, the brief morning podium-announcement event highlighted the message about SD62 being the fastest-growing school district on Vancouver Island, and how the provincial government is doing its best to keep up with funding and decision-making for land purchases (school location) and construction (timelines to keep up with student population growth).

The new high school’s current seat count of 800 was surpassed at day one in September 2015. Presently there are nearly 1,000 students at Royal Bay, where over 10 portable classrooms are in use to accommodate the overflow. The additional 600 seats are to be ready for the opening of school in September 2020.

There are presently 59 portable class-

Construction is well underway for the addition of 600 seats (for total 1,400) and a third gymnasium at Royal Bay Secondary, to be open in Sept 2020.

rooms in use around the growing school district in Langford, Colwood and Sooke; five more are coming for Fall 2019.

The consistent increase in student population since around 2014 has been driven by the increase in housing development in the fast-growing west shore

where housing prices are more relatively affordable for families compared to core areas of Greater Victoria.

SD62 has land for additional schools, with the next school construction being an elementary/middle combo in Westhills in Langford. **WSV**

Data-dump left for region to sort out

The audience seemed to hope for more, feeling a bit shortchanged on a sense of understanding about what really sets the economic tempo of southern Vancouver Island. There were about 180 business people, elected officials and community leaders at the sell-out luncheon on April 18 co-hosted by the Victoria Chamber of Commerce at which the South Island Prosperity Project (SIPP) group presented their second data snapshot of economic factors of the Greater Victoria area encapsulated as the South Island Prosperity Index.

The index measures indicators “relative to our local economy”, says SIPP, comparing them to other cities across the country with a focus on economic resiliency, transportation and mobility, housing and affordability, human health, and environmental health. SIPP boasts 53 member organizations, and growing.

SIPP’s main presenter – economist Peter Norman of Altus Group in Toronto – aimed to inform the attentive audience about their region with clues for fostering economic growth. But in their choice to utilize the services of a Toronto-based economic analyst – and further, to present comparative data almost entirely from urban centres in southern Ontario and Quebec – SIPP left a sense of disappointment in their audience. Even with a glossy printed executive summary distributed upon leaving the event, some of the audience effectively left empty-handed.

In the question period, Colwood councillor Doug Kobayashi asked if the data wasn’t in fact comparing ‘apples to oranges’ (not finding any relevant comparison to the south island in data from southern Ontario). And another community leader implied that the data didn’t examine the mild year-round weather component of having higher per-capita number of homeless people on the island. Precisely, this was a data dump, left for listeners to sort through and find any gems.

Afterward, Oak Bay Mayor Kevin Murdoch said he was perplexed at how lack of any one strong industry in this region was considered a plus (the presentation included an example of the vehicle manufacturing industry in some Ontario towns being so large that when it fails it causes more problems than if numerous smaller sectors experience ups and downs). Murdoch said he felt cities in the study were “isolated capitals” and “difficult comparators”.

SIPP uses data that is voluntarily submitted to the World Council on City Data, said Norman. There is no proactive solicitation of unique or targeted data; they take what they find. Without realizing it, communities that don’t submit data by ISO standards to the World Council are putting themselves at a disadvantage, but only if they want to walk in step with reports from organizations like SIPP. That’s a leadership choice from within communities across the country.

Where there may have been some agreement between speaker and audience was that a strong government office component in the workforce is a contributor to regional economic stability. The core area of Victoria enjoys that component at the present time. Langford has long sought to woo provincial government offices to its west shore location for that very stability in the commercial leasing sector and for reducing the need for large numbers of employees to commute.

If the point of the presentation was to raise more questions than answers, it succeeded. There will likely be reference to the perceived shortcomings of the index as much as its instigation of conversation about regional economic factors.

She looks for more detail on housing affordability, which she said is “a big concern for all of my constituents”. She admits that the federal Greens are still developing their Fall 2019 election platform and that the SIPP report will be reviewed for data “that brings to

SIPP says they are not a lobby group, but one prominent guest – federal Green Party Leader Elizabeth May, MP (Saanich-Gulf Islands) – told the crowd that she would certainly be using what she called the ‘holistic thinking’ of the presentation toward “finding measurements of well being”. About the report, May said: “It really helps policymakers and I hope we’ll have some willing partners on the federal level to pick up on the direction of analysis that’s coming out of SIPP.” She declared: “If you don’t measure it, it doesn’t matter”. May did wonder about some of the data, such as whether a tallied high rate of suicide included opioid-related deaths which are probably not suicides if unsuspected fentanyl was a factor, and to what degree social supports are provided alongside a tally of mental health-related events or deaths.

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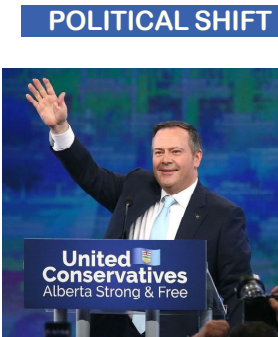

Notley’s NDP falls to consolidation of the right

Premier Rachel Notley’s NDP government fell to defeat in the April 16 Alberta provincial election. Formerly the majority government for four years, the NDP’s seat count is now 24, down from 52. Of 87 ridings, the United Conservative Party (UCP) under the leadership of Jason Kenney captured 63, with 54.8% of the vote compared to the NDP’s 32.1%.

Notley’s concession speech Tuesday evening in Edmonton was gracious and informative about the successes of her government in areas of both social and economic policy. Had she delivered with that tone and type of rightful claim to success during the campaign instead of taking a scrappy approach, there might have been a different result. However, four years ago in the May 2015 election she did break the 40-year conservative domination of Alberta politics, and it was probably a scramble for her to both put the NDP stamp on Alberta governance while toughening up her approach into something robust for majority re-election. All the while, Kenney was busy absorbing the conservative Wildrose Party and other

light different connections”. A big factor for May: “We need to make sure housing is available where we work.”

As emcee, Bruce Williams thanked the speakers for the update of the previous report (by a previous analyst group) of 18-months ago: “People can see what changed, what got better or worse”. And while afterward Norman told West Shore Voice News it wasn’t about eastern Canadian cities versus west, the fact remains that no data was included from any western provinces other than BC, and that within BC it was only Greater Victoria and Surrey (unsimilar cities). Size of a town is only a single factor that doesn’t necessarily address differences in community or regional culture, tone and attitude.

Questions from the event’s marketing material such as hinting at clues about more water usage per capita in this region compared to Ontario were not answered, just asked. On that point, there are more months of the year here in the long growing season of a nearly perpetual mild climate where the watering of landscaping is both desired and required; personal water consumption in households might be exercised with great caution but data on the broad scale might still only show ‘higher usage’. This sort of scenario is an example of where data without context can be weak or misleading.

Esquimalt Mayor Barb Desjardins attended the luncheon. She said afterward that the presentation will help the region “understand how we fare in the different categories against peer communities, but more important, it shows areas where we may want to focus greater resources on to improve our region’s economic growth”. Desjardins points to how “transportation improvements for moving people and goods provides significant economic benefits”.

Langford Mayor Stew Young is familiar with the SIPP project. He feels that any true action for job creation and true economic development is overshadowed by promotional goals of the SIPP project. Indeed, Victoria’s lone star

However, with the NDP holding onto 24 seats where prior to her 2015-2019 majority the NDP only held four is a significant accomplishment. Notley now leads a new Official Opposition in Alberta. Hopefully the stance she felt necessary against BC and fellow NDP-Premier John Horgan will leading Alberta will soften, for all good political reasons.

An interesting political wrinkle is that with a large number of NDP MLAs in the next Alberta legislature being around Edmonton there could emerge a robust two-party counterpoint in Alberta politics. Edmonton-elected Notley in the north, Calgary-elected Kenney in south. That’s much different than when conservative politics ruled for 40 years without much room for any liberal or progressive voice.

Neither the Alberta Party nor the provincial Liberal Party won any seats. “We will strive to be a government for all,” said premier-designate Jason Kenney.

Kenney in his election night victory speech went broad on the economic file. He addressed national interests, setting Alberta as a leading economic force for the country, and internationally. “Alberta is open for business,” he said to the nation and the world, naming the United States and China in his remarks.

And he took direct aim at the federal Liberal carbon tax, claiming leadership for Alberta in setting the tone of fighting that approach to dealing with climate change in Canada. WSV

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presence in the national scheme of things promotes this region more than the data helping locally where trends are already evident.

Norman said the role of SIPP is to bring issues to light toward enabling partnerships and seeing smart decisions. Data is presented, and some people will work with it, but there is as much disarray stirred up as there are actual frameworks that can be discussed or acted upon. That’s a lot of undirected homework.

SIPP’s work may foster discussion. But without a lot of deeper analysis the raw data could also muddy the waters for any municipalities or project groups that choose to work with the material. If leaders are looking for third-party answers or guidelines for ‘wat to do next’, this is only one watering hole from which to draw resource.

View Royal Council backs Beckett Memorial Playground with \$5,000 donation

● **The next phase of honouring the late Cst Sarah Beckett is emerging.** While immediately following the West Shore RCMP officer's tragic death in a vehicle crash in April 2016 – and for a few years after that – there have been a range of memorials, now the approach is turning to ongoing celebration of her life.

Development of the Sarah Beckett Memorial Playground in City Centre Park in Langford is fast underway, toward completion ahead of a big concert and soccer event at the adjacent Westhills Stadium on August 24.

A total of \$250,000 for the playground equipment is being sought by the Rotary Club of West Shore. The City of Langford is paying for redevelopment and expansion of City Centre Park location, at a cost of about \$1 million.

A presentation about the playground fundraising effort was made to View Royal Council at their regular council meeting on Tuesday evening, April 16, by Dianna Seaton on behalf of the local Rotary.

View Royal Mayor David Screech said his council [Councillors Damian Kowalewich, Gery Lemon, Ron Mattson, and John Rogers] had already decided to donate \$5,000 to the playground project and was glad for the presentation to hear more details.

"It will be a safe and environmentally-friendly playground," said Seaton. There will be two sections of the playground, one area with equipment suitable for preschoolers age 2 to 5 years, and one area for children age 5 to 12 years.

"Families need spaces with various degrees of mobility. Equipment has been selected to meet those criteria," Seaton told View Royal Mayor and Council in a short presentation next to a projected image of the late Sarah Beckett with her two young sons enjoying use of a playground. "Sarah's husband is strongly supportive and involved in the process," said Seaton.

Seaton will be making similar presentations to three more councils in the west shore area: Colwood, Metchosin and Highlands.

Other fundraisers have included the Rotary's Annual Lobsterfest in March and also the Sarah Beckett Memorial Run on April 13, as well as their booth at the Millstream Village Easter Event this weekend. Bricks with engraved messaging are also available as a way for the public to make a donation.

Dianna Seaton is Vice-Chair of the Sooke School District 62 board of education and a lifelong resident of Sooke and the west shore. **WSV**

Sooke Choir plays the love chord

● **"This will be a big, loud, emotional show,"** says Sooke Community Choir artistic director Bruce Ruddell. "The *#modernlove* concert title is cheeky. It's meant to be very contemporary, as the music is too," he told *West Shore Voice News* this week.

"The whole program is based around the chaos of relationships... good, bad and indifferent. They're all big hits, amazing arrangements," says Ruddell. He laments a bit about "how hard it is to find really good arrangements these days – publishers are all owned by huge companies like Disney... they get rid of the music, so it's hard to find".

"There's a growing number of young people in the choir now. They brought me pieces of music that I wasn't really cognisant of. We're doing pieces like *A Thousand Miles*, *Count on Me* and *Uptown Funk* (Bruno Mars), and *Love Shack* (B52s). "It's been like holding back horses," says Ruddell about the enthusiasm of his 60 or so singers.

Great solos and adding a musician are highlights for this season's concert. Working alongside the choir's longtime pianist Kathy Russell will be Jeff Poytner who covers a range with sax, keyboard, and horns. And with full-on lighting, it'll be a show.

"There's a reason why pop music is popular – it touches people, both lyric and music touch you in ways that last your whole life in a way," says Ruddell who is a member of the Canadian League of Composers and the Canadian Playwrights Guild of Canada.

The *#modernlove* concerts will be held Friday May 3 and Saturday May 4 at 7:30 pm, and Sunday May 5 at 2 pm – all of those at Sooke Community Hall, 2037 Shields Road (tickets at Shoppers Sooke, The Stick and at eventbrite.com). 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Making history: Pacific FC launch on April 28

● **“Be a part of history”** is the buzzline from Pacific FC about their inaugural game coming up on Sunday April 28. And that's not just puffery.

Not since 1986 has Canada qualified for the men's soccer World Cup. And for decades Canada has not had a domestic professional soccer league. Then came the Canadian Premier League (CPL) which last fall launched with seven teams across the country. Here on Vancouver Island is Pacific FC, based out of Victoria with all matches played at Westhills Stadium in Langford.

With so many youth enjoying soccer at school, on community teams and in academies, it's a natural move for pro soccer to ramp up the interest and skill levels toward 2026. That's when Canada will co-host the 2026 World Cup along with the USA and Mexico. The launch of that long-held dream of a domestic Canadian pro league – through which young Canadian players can develop – will be realized this week with CPL's inaugural game on Saturday April 27 at Tim Hortons Field in Hamilton at 1 pm EST (10 am PDT). That's a match between Hamilton-based Forge FC vs York9 FC (home games at York University's York Lions Stadium). Watch CPL live on CBC-TV and CBC Gem streaming service.

But there's nothing like the energy of being in the stadium for a live match. Here in the west shore, that first opportunity comes up Sunday April 28 at Westhills Stadium in Langford. Pacific FC will launch their inaugural season here that day, in a 7 pm home game against the HFX Wanderers landing on the island here from Halifax. CBC will be the exclusive television broadcast home for 10 key Canadian Premier League games throughout the 2019 season (schedule at <https://canpl.ca/article/cbc-sports-mediapro-canada-partner-to-provide-20-match-live-broadcast-of-cpl-season>) including a special big-blast home game for Pacific FC vs ValourFC at Westhills Stadium on Saturday August 24 at 6 pm.

This week Pacific FC signed centre back Ryan McCurdy. Sooke medical office: sometimes there are fees for missed appointments

● **There is a shortage of family physicians in Sooke.** “When appointments are missed, we have missed an opportunity to provide care to someone else in need,” says Dr Anton Rabien of the West Coast Family Medical Clinic at Evergreen Shopping Centre in Sooke.

“Our clinic experiences 150 to 200 missed appointments per month, not including last-minute cancellations. We certainly appreciate a phone call if patients are unable to make a booked appointment, and as a rule, we do not bill patients who make the effort to contact us,” said Dr Rabien this week.

“We are aware that some of our patients face difficulties with transportation and/or finances, and we certainly take that into consideration,” he said.

Invoices for missed appointments at West Coast Family Medical Clinic include a preamble about the shortage of family physicians in the community, and: “You are receiving this invoice because you missed a booked appointment today and did not notify us to cancel that appointment.”

The clinic in Sooke includes nine family physicians, supported by allied health care providers from the Island Health Sooke Health and Wellness Team (including registered dietician, registered social worker, registered nurse), visiting specialist physicians, and medical office assistants as well as medical support staff.

West Coast Family Medical Clinic is a teaching facility. Patients can expect both medical students and resident physicians to be involved in their care. **WSV**
