# Student hit by vehicle while crossing Hwy 14 (Sooke Road) to get to school

In conditions of heavy rain, dark predawn skies, wet roads and commuter traffic, on Thursday morning December 12 a teenage girl was struck by a vehicle while crossing Highway 14 on her way to Edward Milne Community School.

The injured EMCS student was transported to hospital where that same morning she was reported in stable condition.

The venicie had been travelling west bound (toward Sooke). The predawn incident occured around 7:45 am (7:56 am

sunrise that day). As of December 13, the name of the student had not yet been released.

The girl is understood to have been walking from a point near Lazzar Road, across Highway 14 (Sooke Road) toward the school, at or near the crosswalk. The crosswalk is unattended by a crossing guard but does have a user-activated flashing light. Investigators have not revealed yet whether the flashing light had been activated, or if the teen was in the crosswalk at the time of the accident.

SD62 sent their critical incident team to the school at 6218 Sooke Road, to be available to with staff and students. Students continued their usual classtime routines. EMCS is a secondary school, with students in Grades 9 to 12.

The crosswalk allows pedestrians to cross the provincial Highway 14 (Sooke Road) which is the only road 'in and out' of Sooke. Weekday commuter traffic out of Sooke in the mornings is significant; about 70% of Sooke residents leave their home base to work in other parts of the west shore and south Vancouver Island.

Sooke RCMP arrived on scene just before 8 am. "Frontline members attended immediately and worked alongside BC Ambulance and the Sooke Fire department who were already on scene," says Cpl. Chris Manseau, Division Media Relations Officer, Sooke RCMP. Initial police reports indicate a green vehicle heading westbound had impacted the student. The driver cooperated with police and was very concerned about the injuries sustained by the victim. Alcohol was determined not to be a factor, said Sgt Clayton Wiebe, Sooke RCMP.

The speed limit on the highway during school hours is 40 km/h, and otherwise is 50 km/h. On that main artery in and out of town, traffic is often travelling at speeds faster than that.

The Ministry of Transportation & Infrastructure (MOTI) said on Friday: "The

ministry's thoughts are with the student hit by a driver on Thursday while crossing the highway to Edward Milne, as well as with their family and friends. Initial reports said the student was crossing in a marked crosswalk with a pedestrianactivated light. The RCMP is investigating, and the ministry review the results of the investigation. In the meantime, the ministry will undertake a review of the crosswalk and adjacent highway to see if additional measures to improve safety could be added."

MOTI also said: "As the region continues to grow, Highway 14 through Sooke will become busier. Safety is the ministry's number one priority, and staff will continue to work closely with the municipality and school district to make sure pedestrians, cyclists and drivers can all safely travel along the corridor."

In the past year, MOTI did install a sidewalk along Edward Milne Road (which runs parallel to Highway 14, in front of EMCS) and improved the Highway 14/Sooke River Road intersection with traffic signal lights.

An open house that unveiled MOTI plans to expand Highway 14 to four lanes (in a section east of Sooke) was held just last week at EMCS, on December 3. The desire by local residents and businesses in the area is for a faster, more reliable commute in and out of Sooke.

While three elementary schools on Sooke Road (Saseenos Elementary, Sooke Elementary and John Muir Elementary) have crossing guards on duty before and after school, the high school on Sooke Road does not. Decisions about funding for crossing guards are up to Sooke School District 62 (SD62). "Crossing guards are funded through municipalities and hired by the district," says SD62 Superintendent Scott Stinson.

The District of Sooke presently provides \$14,000 per year to SD62 for the cost of crossing guards, and a \$9,000 additional request for 2020 was made to the municipality by SD62, says District of Sooke CAO Norm McInnis. "The request was for another guard due to grown," says SD62 Secretary-Treasurer Harold Cull.

In the other west shore municipalities where SD62 schools are located there are also municipal contributions: Langford currently pays \$42,000 and Colwood currently pays \$14,000. "These are historical amounts and have not taken into consideration our recent growth," says Cull. The other municipalities served for public education by SD62 but where there are no actual schools (Highlands, Metchosin and View Royal) do not pay for crossing guard services.

Crossing guards are employees within CUPE. The crosswalk locations served by crossing guards "have been in place a while", says Cull. He says the locations were probably initially based on risks on a site by site basis, as determined by the school district.

Will SD62 consider making any changes to crossing guard or crosswalk arrangements outside EMCS? "It would be premature on our part to make any decisions or recommendations at this point," says SD62 Superintendent Stinson. "We will allow the RCMP to complete the investigation and then see if there is anything we might consider doing," he told West Shore Voice News on Friday.

MOTI is responsible for the flashing light at the crosswalk on Highway 14. Crosswalks on municipal roads such as Goldstream Aveue (such as in front of

#### Agriculture

**BC food production revenues up** West Shore Voice News

> BC farmers, ranchers, seafood and processing workers contributed to a record-setting year (2018), says the Ministry of Agriculture. "It was an excellent year for agriculture in British Columbia. The hard work of many has led to record results," said Lana Popham, Minister of Agriculture.

> Annual business revenue in those sectors reached \$15 billion, including a 4% rise in food processing, 6% in agriculture and 11% in seafood revenues. The number of overall sector employees increased to a 10-year high of 63,400, with 2,300 more jobs than in 2017.

BC consumers and companies are the main buyers of BC products, with an estimated \$6.4 billion of purchases.

The Ministry of Agriculture began a new mandate in 2017 to support BC farmers through a three-pronged approach:

\* Grow BC, which creates a network of food hubs supporting entrepreneurs and food processors around the province, and has programs to increase production and support new farmers;

\* Feed BC, which encourages the use of BC products in government-operated institutions and facilities; and

\* Buy BC, which is helping more than 200 BC companies promote their products in BC, as well as developing partnerships supporting local foods in retailers. **WSV**

SD62 trustees re-elect Ravi Parmar as their Board Chair by Mary P Brooke ~ SD62 coverage at the board level since 2014

• At the December 10 board meeting of Sooke School District 62 (SD62) the trustees held an election for Chair and Vice-Chair. In a show of solidarity and support, the Board of Education re-elected Chair Ravi Parmar, while acclaiming Trustee Bob Beckett as their new Vice Chair.

Parmar was first elected as a Trustee in 2014, and re-elected in 2018; this is his second time as Chair. A former Langford Fire Chief, Beckett was newly elected as a trustee in October 2018.

The full board term is 2018-2022. The trustees are: Ravi Parmar, Chair (5 years service - Belmont Zone); Bob Beckett, Vice-Chair (1 year service - Belmont Zone); Wendy Hobbs (23 years service - Belmont Zone); Bob Phillips (20 years service -Milne's Landing Zone); Margot Swinburnson (20 years service – Milne's Landing Zone) and Allison Watson (1 year service - Milne's Landing Zone). Allison Watson was chosen by her fellow trustees as the new BC School Trustees Association (BCSTA) Provincial Council Representative (nominated by Margot Swinburnson who will serve as the Alternate). Bob Phillips is the new BC Public School Employers' Association (BCPSEA) Rep, with Bob Beckett as Alternate. SD62 school trustees are elected by the public in two zones, alongside municipal elections. The Belmont Zone trustees are elected by voters in Langford, Colwood, Highlands, Metchosin and parts of View Royal. The Milne's Landing Zone trustees are elected by voters in Sooke, East Sooke and Juan de Fuca area out to Port Renfrew.

#### UK landslide: pro-Brexit

In the UK (England, Scotland, Wales) and Northern Ireland) on December 12, Conservative Party leader Boris Johnson achieved a resounding victory in a rare Christmas-season general election, capturing 365 of 650 seats (326 needed for a majority), with 43.6% of the vote. He vowed to the British public that he will 'get Brexit done' by January 31, 2020. Scotland may still want independence from the UK so it can stay in the European Union. WSV


Trustee Dianna Seaton was thanked for her service as Vice-Chair over the past year and a half. She also has chaired the Resource Committee which crunches the budget numbers and in the past year has explored school bus transportation issues. New chair appointments (for Education Policy Committee, Resource Committee, and Audit Committee) will be made by Chair and Vice-Chair in the new year.

In a short speech to the board upon his re-election as Chair on Tuesday night. Ravi Parmar said that the board's strategic plan (presently for 2018-2021, with the three planks of Learning, Engagement and Growth) will soon come up for review, to see how actions and outcomes are lining up with the plan.

Parmar said the board is excited about the expansion of Royal Bay Secondary School coming on stream in 2020 as well as the start of construction of two new schools (elementary and middle) in the Westhills area of West Langford. On December 11 at Hatley Castle, Royal Roads University (RRU) was pleased to announce that they're putting "the finishing touches" on 2019, including a business case for a new post-secondary campus on the west shore. "I'm happy to tell you tonight that we are just days away from submitting the business case to the Ministry of Advanced Education, Skills and Training," said Cheryl Eason, Vice President and Chief Financial Officer, RRU. Partners in the initiative are the University of Victoria and Camosun Col-

lege, with strong input from the City



of Langford. Likely to be located in Langford, the new campus will aim to address the post-secondary and labour market demands of the west shore (primarily for residents and businesses in Langford, Colwood, and Sooke where Sooke School District 62 provides K-12 education to over 11,000 students). #### **Poinsettias generate** funds for VGH equipment


The Victoria General Hospital (VGH) Auxilitary reports success with their annual Poinsettia for Patients fundraising campaign in this 2019 holiday season.

"We are trying to improve the ambulatory lab and make it more kid-friendly. Having blood taken can be traumatic enough, so we re trying to make it feel more calming," says Val Smith continued VGH Auxiliary Vice-President.

Most Auxiliary revenues are generated with sales at the concourse gift shop which is operated entirely by volunteers who also sell Purdys chocolates. WSV



### Holiday season electric lighting safety tips West Shore Voice News

- Use Canadian Standards Association (CSA) certified light strings/sets.
- . Use the proper lights for the environment. Indoor light strings/sets should not be used outdoors because they lack weatherproof connections. Some outdoor light strings/sets burn too hot indoors.
- Inspect light strings/set before use. Check for cracked bulbs and for frayed, broken or exposed wires, and discard if faulty.
- · Do not use electric light strings/sets on metallic trees. A faulty system could energize the tree and shock or electrocute anyone coming into contact. Illuminate metallic trees with colored floodlights placed at a safe distance from the tree and out of reach.
- Turn off all tree and display lights before heading to bed or before leaving the house.
- Use only CSA certified light strings. Read the labels and manufacturer's instructions to ensure proper use.
- Do not overload wall outlets during the holiday season; it's unsafe even for short recycle periods.
- Inspect all cords before use, looking for loose connections or frayed/exposed wire.
- Discard any defective cords.
- Insert plugs fully into outlets. Poor contact may cause overheating or shock.
- To avoid overheating of extension cords, do not coil or bunch when in use; do not Source: CRD website run under carpets or rugs. WSV



#### BC Hydro works support community growth

• As the west shore population grows, BC Hydro is keeping up with various installations and upgrades to their local infrastructure. Recently:

• A set of three voltage regulators were recently setup alongside Highway 14, beyond Langford, near Kangaroo Road. Voltage regulators maintain a constant voltage within an area and help maintain power quality. "They are needed to support the system as a result of future growth in the area," says BC Hydro rep Karla Louwers. There is a steady increase in housing in the Sooke area, and starting 2020 there will be more Highway 14 improvements in the area within range of East Sooke, Metchosin and Sooke.

• In downtown Langford, there is a scheduled power outage for late Sunday night December 15 into early Monday morning December 16 (along Goldstream Avenue, and along Peatt Road to Station Avenue) where there is an increase in rental housing and commercial space in the area. "The outage is required to allow crews to install flagline and cover up on our equipment," says Louwers. "Crews will be adding these visual markers to equipment along Peatt Ave from Hockley Ave to Goldstream Ave as well as along a portion of Hockley Ave. Flagline and cover up on our equipment provide a visual aid for construction workers helping them maintain the limits of approach when working near powerlines. The installation is related to construction activity in the area," she told *West Shore Voice News.*

• Getting off the trails from a ride and onto the bus with your bike will soon be a reality. This month, BC Transit will start phasing in new bike racks to accommodate bikes with tires up to three inches (75 mm) across the province.

The use of bike racks is increasing in popularity for commuters (as a first mile and last mile solution to help connect them door to door), or as a convenient way to go home after a trail ride.

Bikes come in a number of sizes. BC Transit's says their customers have expressed their need for a bike rack that can accommodate bikes with tires larger than the previous two-inch (50.8 mm) maximum allowance.

"The results from our testing indicated that we can safely approve this wide tire bike rack for BC Transit's customers", says Jeff Coleman, supervisor, fleet engineering, BC Transit.

Many different bike racks were tested throughout the process and the model that best met BC Transit's needs for safety and customer convenience was the Apex 2TM by Sportworks.

Customers have asked about racks that can hold three bikes, and BC Transit tested various threebike racks. However, the three-bike racks did not meet BC Transit's safety expectations due to issues with the headlight obstruction. For accessibility and safety reasons, bikes cannot come on board, so bike racks are positioned on the front exterior of
