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Three young men die in Sooke River overflow by Mary P Brooke West Shore Voice News Parks gate closure management is updated



Sooke River Road in heavy rain (February 6), with a view toward the Sooke Potholes. Even a few inches of pooled or running rainfall can impact a driver's control of a vehicle.

Most people in Sooke were in some way impacted by news of the death of three 20-year-old local men. Either they knew Eric Blackmore, Cory Mills and A.J. Jensen -- who were somehow swept away in their truck during heavy rains on a high tide night of Friday January 31, or they know family and friends of the deceased, or the people around them where they work, study or socialize has been impacted by the tragic event.

Apparently many locals know that the Sooke Potholes fill up fast with water from the Sooke River when weather and tide conditions conspire. On the weekend in question, people's outdoor lawn chairs and even propane tanks became floating objects along with debris from the natural environment, pushed by the river beyond its banks into the adjacent forest and onto the road.

The grief of family and friends is of course incalculable. A crowd-source funding page was set up, to which the broader community has been contributing. As of February 10, \$27,000 had been raised by 329 mostly local people in seven days, toward the \$30,000 goal. The funds are for helping the three impacted families through what are likely to be difficult weeks and months ahead.

Where community leaders have focused their ability to make a difference is in examining the conditions of the potholes entry points. No one knows, but perhaps had Blackmore, Mills and Jensen not been beyond the park gate that fateful evening, perhaps this tragedy might have been prevented.

Voice Newart of the Sooke Potholes is a BC Provincial Park (lower area), and the upper area is owned and operated by the Capital Regional District (CRD). The road heading into the park is Sooke River Road, owned by the District of Sooke.

According to Juan de Fuca Electoral Area Director Mike Hicks, the gate to the lower park that is the responsibility of BC Parks was "probably by now rusted in place" and was not for years closed each night as it was supposed to be. Hicks became vocal about this in the days following the tragedy (including a widely-heard interview on local radio), and Sooke Mayor Maja Tait learned that the gate requiring provincial management was on a District of Sooke right-of-way (she told West Shore Voice News on Friday). In a scenario of multi-jurisdictional complexity, the District of Sooke had not communicated with BC Parks about gate-inaction for years, likely leaving it up to the provincial government in their park. Hicks got the Premier involved, and the BC Environment ministry (responsible for BC Parks) has confirmed "the gate will be closed the same hours as the CRD gate." BC Parks will contract with the same operator that CRD has on contract to close another gate. Now the park will be closed from 9 pm to 7 am as it always was supposed to be. The CRD says on its website: "The Sooke River is an area of steep cliffs and deep fast-moving water. Please use caution and wear appropriate footwear. Stay on designated trails." As Hicks said in the media, going down to the potholes is 'just what kids do in Sooke'. Mayor Tait says that in a current five-year District of Sooke roadworks improvement plan (now in year three), that some work has been done on drainage around Sooke River Road. The municipality's engineering department reports through District of Sooke Acting CAO Raechel Gray: "In 2018 a major drainage project was completed to address the most prominent location of flooding on the road which has significantly reduced the severity of the flooding and the time it takes for standing water to drain. There are currently no plans for any new drainage projects on Sooke River Road. At this point it would be too early to speculate what further work could be recommended until an investigation of the accident is completed." wsv

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Coronavirus stirring up public opinion & personal decisions

Obviously health officials want to be cautious and not incite fear. But overall, the general public is still a bit quizzical about the information they are getting and when they get it. A lot of moment-by-moment decision-making is being left up to individuals. People are seeking the right type and volume of information to help support them in making the best possible decisions. When so many people still reel a bit unsure, it does indicate some of communications disconnect (likely based on an abundance of caution). The media is, overall, picking up on that frustration and doing their best to inform. Most Canadians are now experiencing calm high alert.



Coronavirus Update West Shore Voice News **CoronaVirus tally**

at February 9, 2020



There are 37,558 confirmed cases of the 2019-nCoV Coronavirus globally (2,676 new) as for the last 24 hours (stats on February 9). Of those cases, 99.18% are in China where there are 37,251 confirmed cases (2,657 new). These are World Health Organization (WHO) statistics.

WHO reports that of the known cases in China, 6,188 are severe (87 new), and there have been 812 deaths (89 new).

Outside China there are now 307 confirmed cases(19 new) in 24 countries (the number of countries has remained stable for days), and 1 death (in the Philippines).

One newborn infant in China was diagnosed as having the Coronavirus just 30 hours after birth. The medical assessment is broad: the virus could have been transmitted in utero, or during childbirth, or after birth.

The WHO risk assessment for China is Very High, while the Global level is called High. WHO has repeatedly stated that they don't want to set off an economic crisis, but the various restrictions on travel to China (e.g. by the USA) are already contributing to economic concerns, as reflected in the stock market to some degree.

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deliver services based on local needs. These funds are intended for supports like trauma counselling, school breakfast or lunch programs, additional support in the classroom, recognizing mental-health issues and early intervention, or tutoring. Recognizing these students for priority funding will ensure the more than \$6 billion in record operating funding is distributed in a way that better represents the number of vulnerable students in BC schools. The amount of money allocated for the



supplement will be announced following Budget 2020 (which is on February 18).

In SD62: "At this point, we have only heard about the intended changes but have not seen how that will translate into funding dollars for the school district," says SD62 Superintendent Scott Stinson. "Given the timing in the school year, the phasedin approach makes sense to ensure that the underlying policy structures will support any additional changes to the funding model. We have been engaged with the Ministry of Education on an ongoing basis as they have been contemplating these changes." wsv

In Canada there are seven confirmed cases, with four of those in BC.

On the Diamond Princess cruise ship, harboured at Yokohama, Japan, all crew and 3,700 passengers are being guarantined for 14 days (to February 19). Passengers are asked to stay in their cabins and to wear a mask when leaving their cabin. Meals are brought to their cabin door. Of the 285 Canadian passengers, eight are infected with Coronavirus (as of February 10).

By comparison, there is a bit more flexibility for the Canadians and permanent residents who arrived back from China and are quarantined at CFB Trenton in Ontario. They can go outside for moderate exercise but must stay two to three feet away from others. Laundry is available but must be scheduled for non-contact with others. Meals are brought to the rooms. That 14-day guarantine in the 290-room Yukon Lodge on the base lasts until February 22. Another plane (which Canadian officials expect to be full) will arrive at CFB Trenton this week, carrying 236 more evacuees.

Federal Minister of Health Patty Hajdu, Federal Foreign Affairs Minister François-Philippe Champagne, BC's Health Minister Adrian Dix and BC Public Health Westfield DP Bonnie Henry are providing updates in news conferences as warranted. Voice Netthe message is repeated as to prevention: regular handwashing, doing proper cough/sneeze etiquette, staying home if you are ill, and phoning ahead to your doctor or health care facility if you plan to arrive with active symptoms. **WSV**

New SEAPARC fitness facility is now open

 The long-awaited expansion of the SEAPARC Leisure Complex in Sooke is complete! The fitness and weight room space opened at 6 am on Friday February 7. An official opening will be held in March.

The new 5,150 sq ft additional footprint to the SEAPARC building is comprised of the new 3,600 sq ft fitness gym and a 1,500 sq ft multi-purpose room. The two areas can be combined for various uses. There is also now a 383 sq ft child minding room.

The expansion by about 5,150 sq ft has increased the 51.020 sq ft footprint of the complex by 10%.

The bright open-space fitness area with high-impact durable Mondo Ramflex interlocking flooring includes lots of workout equipment such as exercise bikes and treadmills for cardio, as well as bench press and weights for muscle strengthening. And there's free wi-fi!

A wall of mirrors facilitates use of the room for dance or fitness. A bank of lockers and water fountain top off the many interior improvements. Overhead LED lighting complements the big-window natural light. There is a handy storage area for sports equipment. And there's a sound system.

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"We're all very excited that the fitness centre is finally open," says SEAPARC manager Steve Knoke.

The parking lot was adjusted during the 10-month construction period (April 2019 through January 2020), now including five handicapped spots near the front door, with more parking spots likely to come at the far end of the building after some draining and lighting improvements. Two electric charging stations in the main parking lot will be moved a little closer to the front door. Bicycle racks are already in place at the front of the building, under a covered area to protect bicycles from the rain. The #61 bus now arrives right up to the front of the SEAPARC building.

It's been an exciting project that moved along, phase by phase. Outdoors a few finishes touches will still be done to the front patio area where there will be a landscaped seating area.

Constructed with pre-fabricated mass timber components, the wood structure (with steel supports) came together relatively quickly. The open space is supported by an HVAC system for heating and cooling, designed and set up for a fitness space where a lot of body heat is generated.

For a few years the SEAPARC Commission saved up funds from the annual levy (paid by taxpayers in Sooke and Juan de Fuca) to help fund this renovation and building improvement, without having to increase the levy. There was also a \$1.4 million grant from the Strategic Priorities Federal Gas Tax Fund (through the Union of BC Municipalities) to help the total project cost of \$3.4 million.

Locals have eagerly awaited the project which began construction last year. The building entry access was moved several times over the last 10 months, for SEAPARC patrons to find their way into the building during various phases of construction. During all phases of construction there was a tone of "we're glad for the renovation, but we'll be glad when it's over!"

Overall, the goal was to be helping more people in the community be active by offering another fitness space in Sooke. SEAPARC has been actively recruiting fitness instructors and weight room attendants.

"A lot of people have been waiting to get in," says SEAPARC manager Steve Knoke. "The community is growing, and this is another space for physical activity and fitness training," he says.

The fitness room area is open during SEAPARC's regular hours of operation: Mon to Fri 6 am to 9 pm, Saturdays 8 to 8, and Sundays 9 to 8 (winter) and 9 to 6 (summer). The weight room is supervised on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays from 8 am to 11 pm, as well as on Thursday evenings (5 to 8 pm).

SEAPARC offers dropin fitness classes and also personal training sessions. Patrons age 16+ are welcome at all times; teens age 13 to 15 years will require a weight room orientation.

Everyone using the fitness center and weight room is required to wear clean, appropriate athletic clothing. Shoes must have closed toes.

The new fitness area can be used as part of regular admission rates. The regular adult rate is \$6.50, with student (19+ with ID) at \$4.75, and youth (age 13 to 18) at \$3.50 per visit. Extra fee for shower and towel rental. 10-visit punch cards and membership passes also available.

The building at 2168 Phillips Road currently presently includes an ice arena (built 1976) and two pools (pool financing now paid). Prior to the upgrade, there was one multipurpose room, and a meeting room (built 2000).

The CRD-owned SEAPARC offering also includes a bike park, skate park, baseball diamond and par-3 golf course. **WSV**

Mayor Tait: community responds with sadness over tragedy of three men loss in Sooke River West Shore Voice News

Hundreds in the community went searching for three 20-year-old Sooke men -- Cory Mills, Eric Blackmore and AJ Jensen -- after they were reported missing on February 1. Their bodies were found by Juan de Fuca Search and Rescue on February 2 (Mills and Blackmore) and 3 (Jensen) near the Sooke River. A piece of the truck they were driving was at first found We in the river, giving a clue as to where the search should focus, said Sooke RCMP Detachment Commander S/Sgt Brett Sinden. West Shore

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Sooke Mayor Maja Tait has provided a statement about the loss of the three young men to the power of the river:

"Words cannot describe the sadness felt in our community. This is a most unfortunate tragedy. We express our deepest and heartfelt condolences to the families and friends, and hold them in our thoughts and prayers. We are very grateful for the search and rescue crew and all of the community volunteers and support for the families and friends." **WSV**



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
