Three protesters arrested by West Shore RCMP

Wet'suwet'en blockade energies spill over to intrusion at Premier's

Tensions have been rising over the environmental rights and jurisdictional issues raised by the Wet'suwet'en hereditary chiefs and their supporters which have resulted in blockades of rail lines across the country that started February 5 (many are still in place).

Punctuating the building momentum was a visit by a group of 'Extinction Rebellion' protesters to the home of Premier John Horgan in Langford on Tuesday February 18 which happened to be Budget Day at the BC Legislature. The global environmental civil disobedience group apparently has the aim of 'compeling government action to avoid tipping points in the climate system, biodiversity loss, and the risk of social and ecological collapse'.

Horgan had already departed for the legislature in his official vehicle when he heard about the incident at his home where his wife was home alone, and the driver turned around. RCMP officers arrived on scene to find protesters blocking the premier's driveway. RCMP moved onlookers and media back from the incident location.

Horgan evidently kept his cool, though later in the afternoon in the Legislative Assembly at moments he was not 100% focussed on the delivery of Budget 2020, with concern clouding his face (proceedings are livestreamed).

Last week entrances to the BC Legislative building were blocked ahead of the Throne Speech, February 11; the usual pre-speech official pagentry was cancelled. Later that day, Horgan released a statement, including: "British Columbians have the right to peaceful protest. We support people in the exercise of their democratic rights -- within the law... my government continues to be available to engage with the Wet'suwet'en Hereditary Chiefs." WSV

says Prime Minister Justin Trudeau On Friday February 21, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau had met once again with his Incident Response Group (IRG), and came out of his meeting with a declaration that the blockades must end and the injunctions

must be enforced.

He and his ministers had repeated all week that in Canada the government does not instruct the RCMP to do their job. But the message is now clear that concerns for a fully functioning rail/transport system which impacts the economy and delivery of many essential products and supplies are overriding most of the patience that federal leadership has sustained in an effort Trudeau and Indigenous to maintain an opening for dialogue.

"Here's the reality," said Trudeau to the media Miller on Feb 21. after the IRG meeting. "Every attempt at dialogue has been made but discussions have not been productive. We can't have dialogue when only one party is coming to the table. For this reason, we have no choice but to stop making the same overtures."

"Of course we will never the close the door on dialogue and our hand remains extended if someone wants to reach for it. In fact, Ministers Miller and Bennett just got off a call with the Wet'suwet'en hereditary chief just minutes ago. But the fact remains the barricades must now come down. The injunctions must be obeyed and the law must be upheld."

"Let me be clear. Our resolve to pursue the reconciliation agenda with indigenous peoples is as strong as ever. There are historic wrongs to right, there are gaps to be closed. There is a relationship to be renewed and new relationships to be built. Canada is ready for this. Canadians want this. But hurting Canadian families from coast to coast to coast does nothing to advance the cause of reconciliation." https://westshorevoicenews.com/trudeau-says-blockades-must-come-down/

By Sunday February 23, some blockades were down but others were put up. 



Before we get into the specifics, let's also note that change by its very nature is incremental, then seems to burst 'suddenly'. People and systems that don't keep up or shift to the new way of doing things can seem notably out of place or find themselves dysfunctional in some way that interferes with stability or progress.

SOCIETY: It's been less than three years since recreational cannabis became legal. See how fast it's all of a sudden not such a big deal? The big rush that big business was expecting has not exactly materialized; there is growth potential but it now just another business as usual. Who would have thought even 10 years ago that medically-assisted dying would be something Canadian society just accepts as part of modern ways? The #MeToo movement seemed to suddenly erupt a few years back, releasing pent up frustrations of millions of women who have endured what was prevalent in the mainstay corporate culture where women have lost so much in the last 50 years in terms of dignity, financial stability and family well-being. **COMMUNI-**TIES: While the world got very much excited about global exploration (embracing worldwide travel as a plank of modern living), since the Great Recession the allure of close-to-home (staycations, binge-watching TV/movies at home, and volunteering or engaging with local initiatives) has been strong. There is now a strong thread of community engagement in most towns and cities across Canada; people are more openly supportive of celebrations, acknowledgements and tragedies. Multi-cultural recognition and acceptance is now pretty much mainstream -- indeed the norm -- in communities across Canada; we live like that now without the blink of an eye, but that's relatively new after decades of transition during Canada's increase in immigration and the welcoming of newcomers. BUSINESS: Finally in the last few years there has been a very real recognition in the differences between small business and large corporate enterprises. Well, perhaps the difference was always noted, but what might be changing slightly is the bloodthirst with which larger companies try to consume the smaller ones (cooperation or co-functionality works better). Chambers of Commerce have always been self-serving for their members -- that hasn't really changed even if they engage in broader communities activities; most chambers still exclude many businesses by embracing their favourite pick. Governments are getting the hang of what it means to 'reduce red tape'. Businesses of all sizes are grateful for the streamlining and simplification of the many layers of paperwork and compliance. There has been a distinct shift in understanding about what business is and does, while at the same time new forms of business structure (e.g. social enterprise) have emerged. A component of community contribution is now included by most businesses in their operational model. **COMMUNICATIONS & the ECONOMY**: Lightning speed! That's how fast the changes have been. If you believe the Star Trek Voyager episode where a 20th century business tycoon happens upon 29th-century technology and henceforth the computer age spins rapidly from pre-computer 1970s to 5G networks and beyond in this decade, you're already with the program. The changes will unfold with compounded alacrity. Within 'moments' we will soon be in an age operated primarily by artificial intelligence, digitization of all things, full surveillance and zero privacy. Your phone is your friend and also your personal spy; it records (and transmits) everything. Anyone who is not aligned to be digitized in all ways will suddenly one day (soon) find themselves left far far behind. Education and job-retraining must keep up with this rapid change as well as government policy for facilitating stable income for people during sudden or massive times of transition. As for content delivered by the communications network, we're all going to have to decide what price we will pay for monoliths like Netflix (in your face). Facebook (in your privacy), Disney (in your dreams), and Hallmark (so much out of touch) deciding on content for public consumption. WELL-BEING: People and planet are rising up to make sure we don't lose sight of feeling good about things. Spirit trumps material.

Coronavirus Undate

Coronavirus tally 019-nCOV Saturday, February 22, 2020 [1 am PST] Stats from the World Health Organization (WHO)

As of February 22, 2020 (1 am Pacific Standard Time) there are 77,794 confirmed cases of the Wuhan coronavirus recently renamed COVID-19 (599 new in the last 24 hours). Of those, 76,392 (or 98.19%) are in China, of which 397 are new. In China there have been 2,348 deaths (109 new).

Outside of China the number of countries reporting COVID-19 infections has increased to 28 (Lebanon and Israel new in the last day, and Iran before that). Outside China there have been 11 deaths (3 new). In Canada there are eight confirmed cases (2 in Ontario, 6 in BC, from which all patients are recovering or have recovered). https://westshorevoicenews.com/now-a-6th-case-of-covid-19-in-bc/

Public health officials continue to remind individuals to wash their hands. observe proper cough/sneeze etiquette, and stay home if feeling unwell.

WHO also advises about surface contamination and transmission.

In sites outside a health care setting (e.g. household, hotel room, cruise ship, etc), transmission can occur from doorknobs, bed rails, bedside table, sink, hand rails, toilet (or bedpan), and floor. In the air flow system, pay attention to ventilation exits and air purifier filters.

In health care settings, WHO recommends keeping track of the time, frequency and details (e.g. type of disinfectant)

of the cleaning and disinfection activities at all sampling locations. Some of the tests done which include propulsion of air (and the possiblity of projecting the virus) in-Voiclade: positive pressure ventilation (bi-level positive airway pressure [BiPAP] and continuous positive airway pressure [CPAP]), endotracheal intubation, high flow nasal cannula, open airway suction, high frequency oscillatory ventilation, tracheostomy, chest physiotherapy, nebulizer treatment, sputum suction and bronchoscopy. Protection of health care workers includes wearing the proper gear including masks and protective gowns or enclosed suits. WSV


Boosting your natural immuni

Working to maintain and boost your own immune system is an important part of the discussion about coronavirus (and flu season more generally). Strategic use of vitamin, mineral and herbal supplements can be helpful.

Most health food stores are getting questions from customers about what to take for immune system support.

Right off the top, Chris at Lifestyle



At House of Nutrition in Colwood, Andrea says three products are particularly popular in flu season: elderberry (syrup or powder), thieves oil (usually a blend of oils from cinnamon, clove, eucalyptus, lemon and rosemary), and Immune 7 (which contains chaga mushroom from birch trees).

At the West Coast Natural Foods store in Sooke, Karam recommends the Natural Factors Anti-Viral tincture (with Echinacea extract) as well as echinacea angustifolia by Prairie Doctor (which is high in antioxidants). "Both are good for the immune system and will fight viruses," says Karam. He also recommends liposomal Vitamin C which encapsulates phospholipids for targeted release in the intestine.

In Langford at OakTree Naturals, Aman says many customers are asking for oil of oregano for immune system protection in flu season. And with the additional emphasis on hand-cleansing, he recommends diluted thieves oil as a hand sanitizer (commercial sanitizers contain isopropyl alcohol which can stress the liver). wsv

SD62 Open House on Thursday March 12

 Designs & names for two new schools in West Langford

Catchment Area review

Input from teachers, staff and broader community was received in October 2019 for suggestions about the names for two new schools (elementary and middle), with internal SD62 deliberations continuing into February 2020. >>




Two new schools are under development on the ground in the Westhills area of Langford, and within the many frameworks of the delivery of public education by Sooke School District 62 (SD62).

More students are on the way in SD62 (about 400 more for September 2020), a pace which is expected to continue to the opening date of the new elementary and middle schools on Constellation Avenue in September 2022.

With great excitement and much preparation, SD62 is preparing to launch this facilities expansion to the community of parents, students, teachers, staff and broader community next month.


On Thursday March 12 -- just ahead of spring break -the community will be given a lot to see and to think about. At an open house on that date at Belmont Secondary School (within the same neighbourhood) there will be a presentation of building designs, new school names (short lists have been compiled by staff for Board consideration), and revision of catchment areas (residential boundaries for deciding which families are attached to which schools).



Now SD62 is accepting public input on the catchment area boundaries. With enrollment in SD62 continuing to rise year over year (in Langford, Colwood and Sooke) SD62 feels it needs to re-evaluate which students attend which schools.

SD62 student population is over 11,000 and is expected to grow by over 400 students per year for the next few years.

One of the first screens in the ThoughtExchange about SD62 Catchment Areas is a map of the large area served by SD62 (including Langford, Colwood and Sooke). >>



"Here we grow again!" is the lead to the catchment area public input portal. The West Langford schools project is being coordinated by former Royal Bay Secondary Principal Windy Beadall who was instrumental in the opening of that high school leading up to September 2015.

District staff have begun a catchment boundary review and are exploring draft options to address student populations in all of the schools, taking into account the new elementary and middle schools to be built in West Langford. The Catchment Consultation Group will bring proposed plans to the SD62 Board in the spring and a public consultation will take place in fall 2020.

Things like allowing students and siblings to attend the same school (even if catchment areas change), walkable distances to school, and how changes in bus and walking routes will be discussed with municipalities are just three of the questions in the ThoughtExchange survey portal. The questions are 'thoughts' submitted by users (no declaration of what SD62 itself has in mind). As of February 22, at least 803 people had participated at the https://my.thoughtexchange.com/#479902312 portal which is available up to March 10. 2020.

The public open house on Thursday March 12 begins at 6:30 pm. WSV

Mitzi Dean on better West Shore Voice Nervices for women and families

 Last week BC Liberal Leader Andrew Wilkinson referred to domestic violence as a "tough marriage".

"He's very out of touch, doesn't understand the issues," says BC Parliamentary Secretary Mitzi Dean. "It was absolutely disturbing that in 2020 a guy would say something like that".

"The premier was totally surprised. He couldn't believe a man in the 21st century would say that. In a position of authority, it was irresponsible of (Wilkinson)," Dean told West Shore Voice News this week.

Dean itemized that "the BC Liberals cut services, closed women's centres, and cut sexual assault centres" during their time in government (during 16 years up to mid-2017).

"In contrast to that we've invested millions in services for people experiencing sexual violence," Dean says about the NDP government under Premier John Horgan.

After just over one year in office, in October 2018 the BC NDP government announced that it would be building 280 new homes to provide safe places to stay for women and children fleeing violence.

Those homes are being delivered in 12 projects around the province. They are the first step in the government's new 'Building BC: Women's Transition Housing Fund', a \$734-million investment over 10 years to build 1,500 transition housing, second-stage housing and affordable housing spaces for women and children fleeing violence.

Dean went on to say that the first Transition House for the west shore is under development in coordination with the City of Langford. That project would have been discussed at the city's Protective Services Committee and development is now in the works with their land use and planning, says Dean. The non-profit Victoria Women's Transition House Society will operate the shelter,

Transition housing in BC is operated by non-profit providers that

specialize in housing and supports for women and children who are experiencing or at risk of violence. The new housing will include provincial funding (through BC Housing) for a range of services, including emotional support and safety planning. Projects will also include new affordable rental housing for women and children ready to move on to more permanent homes.

Dean ran the Pacific Centre Family Services Association in the west shore (with services in areas of Langford, Colwood and Sooke) for 10 years before entering provincial politics. She was elected as MLA for Esquimalt-Metchosin in May 2017, and shortly thereafter (once the NDP formed government with BC Green support in July 2017) was appointed as BC's first Parliamentary Secretary fof Gender Equity.

That new Gender Equity post was created by Premier John Horgan in recognizing the "culmination of realizing still a lot of work in this area to be done and that it required leadership to pull everything together," says

Dean says she was "pleased to see the tax on the wealthiest one percent" in Budget 2020 that was delivered by Finance Minister Carole James on February 18. "Over 70 percent in that (income level) are men with privilege and advantage," says Dean. wsv

About 20 people showed up for the Annual General Meeting of the Juan de Fuca Performing Arts Centre Society (JDFPACS) on Sunday afternoon, February 23 at the JDF Library in Colwood. A few new members joined upon arrival.

JDF Performing Arts Centre Society: in the black

Led by JDFPACS president Judith Cullington, the meeting included review of the 2019 financial statement, a quick presentation by local financial advisor Mike Reilley on how the organization might gain donations from donor securities, and a detailed presentation by Royal Roads University professor Brian White on how to build sustainable cultural precincts and districts within municipalities and regions.

A location for the long-sought performing arts centre for the west shore has been narrowed down from several options, said Cullington. No firm news yet.

Cullington says JDFPACS operates with a lean budget. Revenues were almost \$11,000 in 2019 and expenses close to that, leaving net revenue of \$1,521.43 (better than 2017 and 2018 which operated in the red). Municipal grants (from Colwood, View Royal, Highlands and Metchosin) and other independent donations made up the lion's share of 2019 revenues, with the organization hoping that more people will use the Thrifty Foods Smile Card Program as a way to make donations as they shop. Details on the group's website at www.building4thearts.com.

Elections were held (led by David Stocks), members voted, and an executive meeting was held immediately following the AGM. wsv

VRTC Feb 25: New handyDART centre, bus shelters

The February 25 public board meeting agenda of the Victoria Regional Transit Commission includes reports on expansion of the Youth Bus Pass program, the Fare-Free Youth Pilot Program, handy DART Youth-Senior Monthly Pass, and an infrastructure update. Those who attend will also hear about the local area transit plans for Sooke, Burnside-Tillicum, and Jubilee.

There are 21 new bus shelters in the region for 2019/20 including two in View Royal and three in Langford. CNG fueling and facility modifications are underway as well as plans for a new handyDART centre at 2401 Burnside Road in View Royal.

Design work is to be completed on the Island Highway Transit Priority Plan (Goldstream Avenue to Hwy 1), for completion by summer 2020.

The Westshore Transit Priority Action Plan is to facilitate "transit priorty in the West Shore". Meetings with the Ministry of Transportation & Infrastructure, Colwood, Langford and CRD detailed some transit corridors and priority options that are now being assessed. Local governments may need to contribute funds; community engagement will be done "as needed".

The Hwy 14 (Connie Road to Glinz Lake Road) project in Sooke will include a new park and ride and new transit stops with bus pullouts.

BC Transit is in the process of procuring a consultant to develop an update of the 2013 Victoria Regional Facilities 25-Year Master Plan. WSV

Colwood 2020 budget deliberations: crosswalks

The City of Colwood held lengthy evening of 2020 budget deliberations in an open format on February 18. The city now livestreams their meetings. Budget items explored included brief mention of this year's 3.5% municipal tax increase (including a 1% set-aside for sustain-

able infrastructure).

rrastructure). Some residents attended, with children, to hear the portion on school crosswalk funding. Crossing guards at Colwood Elementary and Sangster Elementary are currently paid for by the city (\$14,000), with hiring and services provided by the SD62 school district.
